

After A Storm

- ◆ If you are in a public shelter, remain there until informed by those in charge that it is safe to leave.
- ◆ Recorded messages will advise of road conditions, damage estimates, utility restoration timelines, curfews, shelter information, times the County expects to allow reentry, etc.
- ◆ Updated disaster recovery and reentry information will be posted on the County's web site at: www.bcgov.net
- ◆ **NOTE: If hurricane damage occurs, there could be a possible delay in allowing residents to return to the County. Emergency workers must return to the county to restore utilities, remove debris from the main roadways, and to carry out search and rescue efforts. Please be patient!**
- ◆ Driving may be especially hazardous due to debris on streets, possible flooding, emergency vehicles in operation, and traffic signals and street lights possibly out of service. Stay away from rivers or streams or other places where flooding is likely.
- ◆ Downed or dangling power lines pose a lethal threat.
- ◆ Make emergency repairs to prevent further damage.
- ◆ Check to see that refrigerated food hasn't spoiled if there has been a power outage.
- ◆ Use emergency water rations until you've been notified that the water supply is safe.
- ◆ Report damage to your insurance agent.



Be Prepared To Return to Wind and/or Flood Damage

INSURANCE COVERAGE

- ◆ Homeowner's insurance typically covers damage from wind, hail, and lightning but not from flooding. A separate flood policy can be acquired through your insurance agent.
- ◆ Homeowner's coverage normally includes the home itself plus contents and extra living expenses made necessary by being forced out of your home. If you're a renter, you may purchase contents and living expense coverage.

Pets



The Beaufort County Animal Shelter and Control does not board pets during a hurricane evacuation. They suggest the following for pet owners :

- ◆ Have a safe place to take your pets. When evacuating, check for hotels/motels that accept pets. Find friends/relatives outside of the affected area that can shelter your pets.
- ◆ Assemble a portable pet disaster supplies kit. Include medications, medical records, leashes, carriers, food, water, can opener, beds, toys, litter boxes, etc.
- ◆ Pets are not allowed in Red Cross shelters.
- ◆ *In the event of a disaster, if you must evacuate, the most important thing you can do to protect your pets is to evacuate them too! Leaving pets behind, even if you try to create a safe place for them, is likely to result in their being injured, lost, or worse.*

BRIDGES

In the event of an approaching hurricane, the SC Department of Transportation will shut down the operation of swing and draw bridges when:

- 1) Sustained winds reach 24 mph
- 2) A mandatory evacuation is ordered

Make plans NOW on HOW you are going to relocate your boat. Also make plans NOW on which evacuation routes you will use.

HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS

- Make plans NOW! Gather and store all valuable paperwork such as mortgage notes, insurance papers, deeds, licenses, photos, etc. You must be able to show proof of ownership for your home or vehicle in order to claim the loss through insurance or FEMA.
- Itemize furnishings, clothing, valuables, etc. Take photos or videos of your home and belongings. This will help adjusters to settle claims. They can also prove uninsured losses, which are tax deductible.
- Gather non-perishable food, drinking water, candles, matches, first aid kits, battery-operated radios, batteries, flashlights, etc. Have these ready at all times.
- Plan and drive your evacuation routes. Know ahead of time where you need to go.
- Plan now to protect your windows with boards or shutters. Pre-cut and store them.

WHEN A WATCH IS ISSUED

- Make sure the car has gasoline.
- Review evacuation routes.
- Listen for weather information.
- Check survival kit.
- Make sure medical prescriptions are filled and medicines are packed to go.
- Gather up important papers, including identification.



Prepare Your Home NOW

WHEN A WARNING IS ISSUED

- Move garbage cans, awnings and all large outside objects into your house or garage, or anchor them securely.
- Place protective covering over windows and garage doors.
- Garage or store vehicles you leave behind.
- Moor boats securely or place inside a building.
- If you have a swimming pool, cover the pump filter.
- If you live in a mobile home, check tie-downs. Leave immediately to a safe place.
- Lock doors and windows before you leave.
- Don't forget a survival kit and other supplies.
- Let relatives know where you plan to go to.

Evacuation Routes

Northern Beaufort County:

The Beaufort area will be evacuated exclusively along US 21 to US 17. Approaching the US 17 intersection in Gardens Corner, the left lane of US 21 will have access to US 17 South and will be directed to Exit 33 (Point South) where motorists will be directed to use the right lane to access I-95 North and the left lane to access I-95 South. The right lane will follow US 17 North to Highway 303 toward Walterboro. Also, motorists wishing to travel towards the Hampton or Augusta area may turn right off US 17 at Pocatigo onto US 21 North to Yemassee and SC 68 West.

Southern Beaufort County:

Hilton Head will be evacuated via US 278 to I-95 and US 17. Both William Hilton Pkwy. (US 278 Business) and the Cross Island Pkwy. (US 278) will be used to get motorists to I-95 at Exit 8. Traffic approaching that interchange will be advised that the right lane of US 278 will be directed onto I-95 North. The left lane will be advised to continue on US 17 North and US 278 toward the Barnwell, Aiken and Augusta areas or exit South on I-95.

An alternate route inland will be US 278 to SC 170 West toward Ridgeland, again connecting with US 278 towards Barnwell, Aiken and Augusta.

The Bluffton area, to include the Buck Walter Community, will be advised to use SC 46 for their evacuation. Motorists will remain on SC 46 to Hardeeville where they will be advised to follow US 321 toward the Estill and Augusta areas via SC 3 and SC 125 or may be routed onto I-95 North/South at Exit 5.

The evacuation route for Sun City residents is pending based on upcoming road construction. Information will be provided to Sun City residents as soon as a new route has been established.



Should a 3rd lane reversal be required to evacuate Hilton Head Island, the 3rd lane would begin at the intersection of the Cross Island Expressway and William Hilton Pkwy. The reversed out bound lane of Hwy 278 will be routed onto Hwy 170 (at the McGarvey's intersection), then onto Hwy 46 toward Hardeeville. Evacuation route signs will be placed at every point on the route where motorists must make a decision.

Other Counties

When evacuating to other Counties, you may want to call ahead to their Emergency Operations Center to speak with a Public Information Officer. It may be helpful to gain information about shelters, hotels, traffic back-ups, etc. Listed below are the phone numbers to the County EOCs and local radio stations for those counties.
